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Message from your President, Helen Tinsley

Welcome to our May 2020 RASHK Newsletter.

I must first thank our membership for your trust and support in electing me as President at our recent AGM held on Tuesday 21 April 2020 and thanks to all those who were also elected to our Council for the coming year, with some change of role for Stephen Davies and the addition of Tony Banham. A full list of Council members is available at the end of this Newsletter.

Our AGM meeting was held using Zoom technology to comply with the current regulatory constraints of social distancing. This was something of a first for RASHK and our membership, but nonetheless successful in linking up our members (including a welcome couple from overseas), achieving a quorum, and getting through the business of the day. I have to thank David McKellar, our Honorary Secretary, and Ieuan Harding, our Administrator, for the smooth arrangements. There were no follow up cocktails to enjoy, but also no charge for the meeting. All relevant AGM 2020 reports are available on our website for more detailed review if you are interested and I will also upload the Powerpoint presentation I used to share a review of last year's RASHK work along with thoughts on challenges for the future. Key points in my review were the impact of civil unrest on our meetings and events planning, followed by control measures related to reducing the risk of Covid-19 infection during this period of local and then global pandemic. We live in extraordinary times.

None of us I think would have anticipated these a year ago at our AGM in 2019 when we looked to the future. In the past year nonetheless, with significant help from a group of our members, we have achieved an IT upgrade to help us better serve our membership, a change of Administrator and a change of office base. Please note that we have discontinued our landline telephone number and now use mobile number (5435 5754) to speak to our Administrator. There will be less projected income in the coming year because of reduced revenue from events, but our financial position remains sound. Donations are always welcome.

We await decisions by HK Government on the staged loosening of restrictions related to social distancing in the coming months in order to keep our Covid-19 infection rates in Hong Kong admirably low. Looking at infections rates, mortality and morbidity elsewhere, we in Hong Kong have much to be grateful for and proud.

We have many speakers lined up and visits planned for when they become safe and possible. In the meantime, we plan to use more Zoom technology to share presentations from guest speakers. Many of these will be linked to topics which have been the subject of recent publications, including many authored by RAS members. Other RAS Asian based Societies have also been generous in sharing their Zoom presentations.

Our Newsletter may be light on lists of activities past and future, but we have taken this opportunity to highlight some significant work by RAS members in diverse fields of study, endeavour and books published. We hope you enjoy reading about them. We will continue to send our Mailchimp prompts of coming events, recordings and presentations which we consider may be of interest to our members.



Mark O'Neill's new biography tells an astonishing story of a young woman who started as a Soviet factory worker and found herself deeply entwined in the political turmoil of the formation of modern China. This is not just a story of a political couple, but rather a wide-ranging and compelling tale of the forces that shaped a political generation - and eventually, democracy in Taiwan.

ONLINE LECTURE

The Last Journey of The San Bao Eunuch, Admiral Zheng He

Saturday • 23 May 2020

This is an online Zoom lecture by Dr. Sheng-Wei Wang, it will be linked to her book The Last Journey of The San Bao Eunuch, Admiral Zheng He.

From 1405, in order to maintain and expand the Ming Dynasty's tributary system, Yongle Emperor Zhu Di (reigning 1402-1424) and Xuande Emperor Zhu Zhanji (reigning 1425-1435) ordered eunuch Zheng He to lead giant fleets across the seas. But soon after Zheng He's seventh and last voyage in the 1430s, the Ming emperors put an end to this activity and ordered all records of previous voyages to be destroyed. Chinese writer Luo Maodeng (罗懋登), knowing the history of some of these voyages, wished to preserve a record of them, but, conscious of the possible penalty, decided to record the facts "under a veil", in his 1597 novel, An Account of the Western World Voyage of the San Bao Eunuch (《三宝太监西洋记》). This is what Dr. Sheng-Wei Wang has concluded after reading and analysing Luo's novel.

Her book, The last journey of the San Bao Eunuch, Admiral Zheng He, shows the methodology and evidential arguments by which she has sought to lift the veil and the conclusions she suggests, including the derivation of the complete trans-Atlantic navigational routes and timelines of that last journey and the idea that Zheng He's last expedition plausibly reached the ancient American Indian city, Cahokia, in the U.S. central Mississippi Valley in late autumn, 1433, long before Christopher Columbus set foot for the first time in the Americas. She supports the hotly debated view that Ming Chinese sailors and ships reached farther than previously accepted in modern times and calls for further research. She hopes this book will become an important step in bridging the gap in our understanding of ancient China-America history in the era before the Age of Discovery. An interesting contribution to an ongoing debate.

Murders of Old China

Friday • 05 June 2020

This is an online Zoom lecture by Paul French, it will be linked to his book Murders of Old China.

One country rich in history, 12 unsolved murders. Reopening the archives on China's long forgotten past.

Why did a remote police station, built to combat pirates, find itself at the centre of a murder-suicide after a constable went on the rampage? How did Chinese gangsters avoid conviction after serving a deadly dinner to Frenchtown's elite? And why is the Foreign Office still withholding a key document to solving a murder that took place in the Gobi desert in 1935?

By delving deep into 12 of China's most fascinating murder cases, Murders of Old China delivers a fastpaced journey through China's early 20th-century history - including its criminal underbelly.

Uncovering previously unknown connections and exposing the lies, Paul French queries the verdict of some of China's most controversial cases, interweaving true crime with China's chaotic and complicated history of foreign occupation and Chinese rival factions.

Julie & Jesse is an art/design studio established in Hong Kong & Jingdezhen by designer Julie Progin (CH) and artist Jesse Mc Lin (US).

The duo's practice straddles between the fields of design, craft and art using function as a pretext for visual discourse and ceramic experiments as a method.

Training in art and different disciplines of design allows them to bridge conceptual and emotional narratives with meticulous making technique.

Julie & Jesse's projects have been shown at institutions such as M+ Museum, Design Society, the Triennale Di Milano & Chicago Design Museum. Their works are held in private and corporate collections as well as public permanent collections at the China Ceramic Museum in Jingdezhen, China, M+ Museum for Visual Culture, Hong Kong. They also work in close collaboration with international design companies such as COS to create unique installations

Jesse McLin

After a childhood spent exploring the redwoods of Northern California, Jesse ventured out to Kansas City then New York to study art and ceramics. There he met Julie and decided to move to Hong Kong to be closer to the birthplace of porcelain. His strong artistic background, coupled with experience teaching design in New York, have led Jesse to first consider the concept of the pieces he creates. Finding the point where fine art and design meet is what makes Jesse tick – a product must respect its material and the history of its form, while always having something new to say.

LOCAL VISIT

History of the Hong Kong Botanical Gardens – Guided Walk

Saturday • 20 June 2020



Details

This event is contingent on social distancing rules being lifted before the event date. As such, plans may change closer to the date as things become clearer.

Event introduction by the organizer, Michel Maruca:

I am a 50-year-old French gardener. I specialise in urban biodiversity, mainly fauna and in creating awareness of the global ecological crisis. On the side, I am also developing another ontology of our world where living organisms have agency and are fighting the Earth. For people interested and can read in French, I explained my view <u>here</u>. This year, I am studying Masters in Ethics and Ecology in which I have to build an exploratory history of the Hong Kong Zoological and Botanical Garden (HKZBG). Below is how I propose to present this work to the RAS.

I have decided to break the HKZBG's history into 5 phases which follow and/or overlap one another. Each phase has left significant impacts on the gardens or even on Hong Kong's landscape for us to see during the visit. Our HKZBG was first a public garden (1864). I will rely on the history of its fountain to illustrate this phase. It then became a botanical garden (1871), the kind of garden it always wanted to be. I will explain this using its main fights against the urban sprawling and the changes in its topography. The gardens also took the lead in Hong Kong afforestation (1880). It provided the first step in the creation of the forests of Hong Kong which was barren before the British colonisation. I will explain the history of this afforestation using the image of our Bauhinia X blakeana tree. If time permits, we can go through the next 2 phases: The HKZBG added zoological to its name (1975). I will narrate this evolution with the help of the zoological enclosures. Where they used to protect visitors from wild animals before, now they also protect animals from humans. The last phase is the current one. It's the way forward, one for us to ponder upon.

I hope to see you on June 20 for a walk around the garden and through its history.

Lecture: Latitude 22N Ceramics Studio Visit

Established in Hong Kong and Jingdezhen, China in 2012 by Julie and Jesse, their design/art studio Latitude 22N is located in a high floor of a factory building in Chaiwan, within a couple of minutes' walk for the end of the Island line MTR station. The number of our visiting RAS group was limited to 10 in order to respect social distancing concerns linked to Covid-19 infection risks at that time. The studio is open, cool and spacious with high ceilings, housing different sections for ceramics display, a firing and workshop area, as well as merchandise display.

We were met by Jesse and Julie who briefed us on the history and conceptual framework of their work which is characterized by experimental ceramic explorations. They use meticulous ceramic techniques and their combined backgrounds in art and design to explore emotional and poetic narratives for various projects. They have produced ceramic objects of extraordinary beauty which are now showcased in various local and international exhibitions and museums. One powerful series of objects came from seizing the movement of clay during firing to archive the breakage and decay of discarded production moulds found in Jingdezhen.

Our group was treated to a tour of their exhibits and heard about the firing process performed on site and well as some of the local commissioned projects with which they have been involved. Many of our group left with samples of their work, potential heirlooms of the future.

If the constraints of social distancing allow at the time, we plan another such RAS visit in June 2020 to accommodate those members who were waitlisted for this visit and could not attend.


RASHK Members' Books – 2019-2020


Summary: JOURNEYS WITH A MISSION contains annotated uncut transcriptions from archival material of five original narratives or journals of travel, covering visits to China, India, Ceylon, Java and Singapore during

the interesting period 1852-1858, undertaken by the Right Revd George Smith, first (Anglican) Bishop of Victoria (Hong Kong), providing a very valuable information resource in two main areas: Protestant (and Roman Catholic) missionary, linguistic, pastoral, medical and educational activity, and the country-situations mainly in China and India at the time.

The Right Revd George Smith had interesting experiences and wrote about them in an interesting way. He was adventurous and courageous. He valued unity, loyalty and affection. He understood historical and cultural perspective and could advocate pragmatism. He had an eye for scenery and a soft heart for suffering humanity. He wrote with care, often in an elevated style suggestive of an inspirational sermon. In the 1850s, edited and cut versions of all five pieces were published in the Church Missionary Intelligencer, a publication of the Church Missionary Society. All are presented here in full, with the cut parts restored and editorial changes reversed. The differences are noted. As a result, insights are gained also into the thinking at that time of a major missionary society, still active today.


Summary: For hundreds of years the Bactrian camel ploughed a lonely furrow across the vast wilderness of Asia. This bizarre-looking, temperamental yet hardy creature here came into its own as the core goods vehicle, resolutely and reliably transporting to China - over huge and unforgiving distances - fine things from the West while taking treasures out of the Middle Kingdom in return. Where the chariot, wagon and other wheeled conveyances proved useless amidst the

shifting desert dunes, the surefooted progress of the camel - archetypal 'ship of the Silk Road' - now reigned supreme.

The Bactrian camel was a subject that appealed particularly to Chinese artists because of its association with the exotic trade to mysterious Western lands. In his lavishly illustrated volume, Angus Forsyth explores diverse jade pieces depicting this iconic beast of burden. Almost one hundred separate objects are included, many of which have not been seen in print before. At the same time the author offers the full historical background to his subject. The book will have a strong appeal to collectors and art historians alike.

Summary: Hong Kong possesses an impressively diverse tree flora with 390 native species. This book celebrates the incredible diversity, beauty and biology of the territory's tree species, highlighting over 100 important species that are individually illustrated in exquisitely detailed watercolour

paintings by Sally Grace Bunker, an acclaimed botanical artist. 

Summary: On the same day as the Pearl Harbor attack, forces of the Japanese Empire attacked the British Crown Colony of Hong Kong without warning. Philip Cracknell provides a research-driven narrative about the Battle for Hong Kong in 1941, which commenced on 8 December and lasted for three weeks until the surrender on Christmas Day 1941. Hong Kong had become a strategic liability, an isolated outpost. It would be sacrificed but

not without a fight. The main priorities for the British in Asia were Malaya and Singapore. The Crown colony was gallantly defended but it was a battle against overwhelming odds.

Crucially, as a resident of Hong Kong for thirty years, the author knows every inch of the ground. He challenges some assumptions, for example the whereabouts of 'A' Coy, Winnipeg Grenadiers on 19 December, when the company was destroyed during a fighting retreat. What exactly happened and where were the actions fought? One can still see so much evidence, in the form of pillboxes, gun batteries and weapons pits. Bullets and other relics can still be picked up lying on the ground. The defending troops mainly consisted of British, Canadian, Indian and Hong Kong Chinese. Dozens were massacred, including over fifty St John's Ambulance personnel - a grim pointer to the hell of the Pacific war that followed. Over the following nearly four years of occupation, an estimated 10,000 Hong Kong civilians were executed. The battle for Hong Kong is a story that deserves to be better known.

Summary: The diva is a nearly universal phenomenon.


Wherever poetry, music and mime have been practised with virtuosity, great women performers always take centre stage. Traditional Asian divas are however less well known and understood among English language readers than the great divas of Mozart and Puccini. Whether from Shiraz at the court

of the Injuids, from Delhi during the twilight of the Moghuls, or from Yangzhou under the last Ming emperors, these Asian divas constitute the first identifiably modern women. Though practising classical and tradition-bound arts, they were economically independent, and were free to give or withhold love. Indeed, in many ways, they paved the way for the emergence of the modern woman in Asian societies.

The diva has left her own lasting legacy across the world. Her message, several centuries old and composed in a learned language, resounds as powerfully today as when first performed, while her art itself shines out far beyond the private salons of the literati, reaching round the world, from the still lively productions of Chinese and Western opera houses to the vibrancy of cinema screens in Bombay and Shanghai.





Summary: Many words have been used to describe John Pope Hennessy, the former governor of Hong Kong. "Controversial" is perhaps the briefest way to outline his character. Yet we may be guilty of ascribing modern ideas to our understanding of characters of the past. An Irish Catholic raised during the age of empire and rising nationalism, a devout Tory and Disraeli follower, a believer in both the benefits of empire and a patron of local talent

in his postings, it is easy to view Pope Hennessy as a man of contradictions.

This volume traces Pope Hennessy's history from his early beginnings in famine Ireland to his attempts to rise through the ranks in London. It goes on to cover his early postings to Labuan, West Africa, and, of course, Hong Kong, as well as his final days with his family. His actions and his personality are laid bare for readers to form their own opinions of one of Hong Kong's most enigmatic governors.


Bhutan: National Order of Merit Gold Award to RASHK Member Brian Shaw



The National Day of the Himalayan Kingdom of Bhutan (17 December) is the occasion for presentation of awards to members of the civil and religious communities, and foreign friends, to acknowledge their varied contributions to the State. On Bhutan's 112th National Day in 2019, the fifth king (the Mi'wang Ngada Rimboche, King Jigme Khesar Namgyel Wangchuck) graciously awarded the National Order of Merit (Gold) medal to five persons (two Bhutanese and three foreigners), including Dr Brian C. Shaw, long-time Life Member (and former Hon. Sec.) of the Society, as an appreciation for services to the Kingdom over several decades.

Brian (ably assisted by wife, Felicity) organised several visits to Bhutan by members of the Society, starting from April 1980. A memorable study tour to eastern Bhutan in 2003 involved long bus rides, overnight tent camping, tent-toilets, tent-showers, and al fresco table-and-chair meals, and was recorded in the Journal (see Robert Nield, "BHUTAN - WHY NOT?", Journal of the Hong Kong Branch of the Royal Asiatic Society, Vol. 41 (2001), pp. 189-239: and John Wilson, <u>A POEM FROM THE HKBRAS</u> VISIT TO EAST BHUTAN, FEBRUARY 2003, Journal of the Hong Kong Branch of the Royal Asiatic Society, Vol. 42 (2002), pp. 459-466).

In more than 50 visits to the Kingdom, Brian has attended many sessions of the National Assembly as an observer, discussed contemporary issues with major decision-makers, and subsequently presented papers on contemporary political and strategic issues to international conferences, published several academic analyses, and completed a digital record of the English-language newspaper Kuensel (1967 to date). For several decades, he also contributed an annual review chapter on Bhutan to reference volumes, including the former Far Eastern Economic Review Yearbook and the Europa South Asia Yearbook. Hundreds of photographs from early visits, documenting how so many things have changed in recent decades, have been tirelessly digitized by Felicity (<u>https://www.bhutanstudies.org.bt/multimedia/bhutan-image-archive/</u>).

The Extradition Archive – A Digital Collection of Published Materials for Private Research By Felicity Shaw

This 18GB digital archive aims to provide a chronological record of events in Hong Kong arising from the introduction of an extradition bill in early 2019, as seen through Hong Kong eyes and English-language media. The collection is indicative rather than exhaustive, reflecting views across the Hong Kong spectrum, including local English language print & online news sources, audio-visual materials, selected tweets & embeds.

Resident in Hong Kong since 1970 and life members of the RAS, the compilers Brian and Felicity Shaw have collected up the materials in this archive solely as a personal project. Everything included has been obtained from publicly available sources. The archive is being shared with others in the interests of free flow of information and in the hope that knowledge of this important period in Hong Kong's history might find its way to future researchers at home and abroad. The current distribution list includes individuals plus several local & international universities.

Content: The archive focuses primarily on the main English language papers published in Hong Kong, in both online and print editions, namely China Daily HK edition; Global Times; Hong Kong Free Press; South China Morning Post; The Standard. It also includes some reports from other Hong Kong news sources (e.g. RTHK). Arrangement is strictly chronological and designed to enable the researcher to follow through the sequence of events and build up a picture of how things seemed in Hong Kong in the context of the times. The material is filed in separate folders by content as follows:

- Audio-visual media, mainly video clips which were embedded in online news reports or posted by citizen journalists;
- News reports, tweets and opinion pieces from local English-medium papers. The news reports include both scans of items clipped from newspapers and online captures from websites of publicly available documents. Selective tweets have also been captured, since social media has now become such an important part of life. Where artwork is embedded in a tweet, a pdf of the full poster or announcement has been attached. (For tweets, in the interests of privacy all personal details other than those of the tweeter and the content of the tweet have been removed.)

The first folders contain news media items etc. and audio-visual media from 2017 to June 30, 2019. There are separate monthly folders for July, August, September and October, while the final folders cover November, 2019 to early 2020.

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

Summary from the China Silk Museum website:

Before humans roamed the earth, plants were already in place. Our ancestors relied on nature for their daily survival, and this relationship-built civilisation. Leaves and twigs were made into temporary baskets to carry hunted and gathered foods. Plant materials were manipulated to make items such as mats, roofs, and walls for shelter. Eventually, plant fibres were extracted and processed into yarns, then woven into cloth to clothe us, giving birth to textile culture.

The hat collection gives us an excellent opportunity to review how plant resources around us affect our lives. Today, in a world over-supplied with colourful manufactured items, these hats, made of perishable materials, might look primitive and outdated. Through these humble hats, let us ponder again, how humans take reference from nature, and how our evolution depends on working with nature.

The museum has chosen sixty-six items from Barbara's collection to highlight their provenance, materials, craft techniques and cultural stores. Paired with maps, travel souvenirs, diagrams and material samples, we hope this exhibition is colourfully light-hearted and, at the same time, educational.


