Message from your President, Helen Tinsley

Welcome to our September/ October 2022 RASHK Newsletter.

It has been a long and hot summer so far, but with some easing of Covid-19 related restrictions here in Hong Kong and more choice for air travel, some of our members have or plan to travel overseas to take a long awaited break or visit family and friends.

After a very busy May and June, our programme of events continued over July and August with some very welcome face to face visits and talks via zoom, both from local and international speakers. Through a pilot link up with 'Walk In Hong Kong' on a very hot afternoon, we had an expertly guided tour of some interesting historical sites in Sham Shui Po, followed by a welcome visit to a recently opened café-restaurant to cool off in airconditioning and sample some delicious snacks and drinks with a Turkish theme. One of our planned talks on the fate of Chinese seamen in UK post WW2 will be postponed to a later date. We have also benefitted greatly from link ups with sister RAS Societies in Beijing and Shanghai with some interesting book talks and expert speakers on China related topics.

ONLINE TALK

Sir Ernest Satow (1843-1929) and his Connections with China

Details

The distinguished scholar-diplomat Sir Ernest Mason Satow is well known for his influential and unique *Guide to Diplomatic Practice* (first published in 1917 with six subsequent editions and a seventh in press) and above all for his early career in Japan, as described in his 1921 memoir titled *A Diplomat in Japan* (London: Seeley Service & Co.) recounting his exciting experiences at the end of the Tokugawa period (the *Bakumatsu*, 1862-7) and the beginning of the Meiji era (1868-9). While it is true that most of his diplomatic career - some 25 years in total - was spent in Japan, it began in China (1861-62) and ended with his most challenging and important posting as H.M. representative in China after the Boxer Uprising (1900-1906), first as British High Commissioner to settle the Boxer claims, and then - after presentation of his credentials to the Emperor at Peking - as Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from February 1902.

This talk will focus on Satow's two periods in China, based on his diaries and correspondence (both semi-official and personal). The speaker has made Satow his main research since 1994 and will introduce various publications, including his edited Peking diaries and letters and his most recent six-volume edited set of Satow's China Correspondence, 1900-06 (independently published via Amazon KDP, 2021).

The Speaker

Ian Ruxton was born in Lima, Peru in 1956. He grew up in Cheltenham, Glos. and was educated in England at Cheltenham College and Cambridge University. He graduated in French, German and Law in 1978 and was awarded a B.A. (M.A. 1981). After two years of accountancy training in London he became a teacher of French and German in English independent schools. He came to Japan on 1 April 1988 to teach English. In 1994 he was appointed lecturer at the Tobata campus of Kyushu Institute of Technology (Kyutech) in Kitakyushu, Fukuoka prefecture on the island of Kyushu. He became professor emeritus of Kyutech in April 2020.



Ian became interested in Satow in 1993 when researching the Kobe Incident of 1868 (See *A Diplomat in Japan*, Chapter 26, where it is called 'The Bizen Affair'). This quickly became the main focus of his research, with his first book *The Diaries and Letters of Sir Ernest Mason Satow (1843-1929): A scholar-diplomat in East Asia* appearing in 1998, and many subsequent books being edited editions of the extensive Satow Papers held at the National Archives in Kew. He officially retired in March 2020 aged 63 but was re-employed for two years during the pandemic, teaching English online and researching Satow, which allowed him to complete the editing and publishing of Satow's China correspondence in 2021.

He lives in Kitakyushu with his wife and cat, and continues to enjoy rugby – watching and playing in a veteran team.

Visit to Chris Hall's Chinese Export Fan Collection


The RAS lecture, "Fans from the East" on 11 February 2022, presented images of the beautiful fans in the collection of the Fan Museum in London. The RAS is now providing an opportunity to see an actual collection of Chinese export fans at the home of Chris Hall which has also been described as a museum. Fans were an essential accessory for a lady in 18th and 19th century Europe. In China a fan was a utilitarian object for daily use, but in Europe a fan was an object of display especially at a ball. Consequently, expensive materials, such as ivory, silver, tortoise shell and gold were used in the making of export fans, whereas most Chinese fans were made of wood and paper and decorated with paint. The ivory fans of the late 18th century display some of the finest and most delicate carving achieved by Chinese craftsmen in the past.

Chris will show his collection of Chinese export fans covering the period 1700 – 1900.

The Speaker

Chris Hall is a long-standing member of the RAS who is well-known for his collection of Chinese textiles. He has also put together a collection of Chinese export fans. This started during holidays in England and visits to the Portobello Road Market. The collecting has accelerated in recent years following two developments:

1. The huge increases in prices of Chinese antiques have made it very expensive to collect most areas of Chinese art. However, Chinese export arts have not suffered the same increase in price and consequently are an area that ordinary people can afford to collect.



2. The bans on the sale of antique ivory have meant that many beautiful ivory fans of the 18th century have appeared on the market at fire sale prices before the trade becomes illegal.

It has been a pleasure for Chris to bring some of these beautiful fans back to the Pearl River Estuary where they were first made.

A few years ago, Roy Delbyck kindly allowed RAS HK members into his Aladdin's Cave for an entertaining and informative peek into his collection of printed materials on China and Hong Kong from the 19th and 20th centuries. Roy has kindly agreed to open his doors again to RAS HK members. The second of what we hope will be several scheduled visits over the coming months will be held on September 17. Space is extremely limited, no more than 5 people, and is only open to RAS HK members who did not participate in previous visits.

Speaker

Roy Delbyck is a Council Member of the RASHK and a member of the Board of Trustees as well as the Secretary of the Museum of Chinese in America, which is located in New York City. Roy is a major collector of printed materials on China and the Chinese experience in the United States, largely from the first half of the 20th century. His collection consists of books, maps, photos, programs, magazines, posters, post cards, luggage labels, letters, diaries, yearbooks, directories, and all sorts of other amazing



ephemera of which he lost count some time ago! Roy has previously spoken to RASHK about his collection and collecting, as well as hosted collection visits by RASHK members. When not collecting, Roy practices US customs and trade law at his own firm in Hong Kong, which he opened in 1993. Roy obtained his law degree from the University of California, Davis and his undergraduate degree from Connecticut College where he studied Chinese.

HYBRID-MODE TALK

Central Market Rendezvous Film Screening and Sharing Session

Details

A market is perhaps one of the most ancient social inventions. Central Market is as old as Hong Kong as a port city, selling food of the best quality and providing necessities for generations and generations of families. The market is a witness of how the city has evolved.

Over the past 170 years, Central Market has been demolished three times and rebuilt twice. The existing modernist architecture was completed in 1939. The market was then given a Grade 3 historic building status in 1990. Since the Market's closure in 2003, there had been debates over its preservation or demolition. Conservation plans were once formulated and scrapped. In the summer of 2017, the revitalisation project finally kicked off. Four years later, which is the summer of 2021, Central Market reopened as a playground for all.

Discussions about the significance of the market has been largely about the architectural merits of the building. In this hybrid-mode talk, Dr Chloe Lai, urbanist, will present her latest documentary "Not Just Buying Food: Central Market Rendezvous" (approximately 30 minutes). The documentary is a collection of interviews with six individuals who used to work or shop at Central Market. They tell us what they remember about the old Market, as well as their expectations for the Market as it reopens. Apart from personal interviews, this short film also includes animations and aerial shots that allow us to view Central Market from different angles.

The Speakers

Dr Chloe Lai is a journalist-turned-storyteller. She curates a digital story museum named Urban Diary (https://www.urbandiarist.com/en/). Urban Diary is a collage of stories which features the arts and crafts of the ordinary Hong Kong people that make the city vibrant, diverse and resilient. Dr Lai uses engaged journalism to narrate stories of everyday life. She firmly believes in discovering different ways of living in the ruthlessly development-driven Hong Kong.



Ian Tan, PhD candidate at HKU, whose research is about architectural history and building materials will trace the development of Hong Kong's sanitary infrastructure and public health measures against diseases like cholera and typhoid fever by focusing on the 2nd generation Central Market built in 1895. He will discuss how the planning and regulation of markets became a means to inculcate good hygiene and a space to showcase the latest sanitary technologies. These experiments to create good public health spaces would influence the planning of subsequent abattoirs and markets, including Kennedy Town Abattoir (completed in 1896), and 2nd generation Western Market (1906), and Ma Tau Kok Cattle Depot (1908).

Romaine Bamford, who first visited the Market in the mid-1950s when she was only five or six, will join the discussion and share her fond memories about the Market.

Details

The Indra and Harry Banga Gallery at City University of Hong Kong (CityU) presents the new exhibition "Hunters, Warriors, Spirits: Nomadic Art of North China" which tells the story of the nomads through the diverse lenses of archaeology, art history, and anthropology.

The exhibition features over 250 artworks from the early 1st millennium B.C.E. to the "golden age" between the 10th and 13th centuries C.E. These include everyday objects and weapons from the early nomads of northern China, such as the Orochen, Xiongnu, Xianbei, and Rouran, presenting not only the ideal relationship between humans and nature but also the nomads' superb arts and artisanship.

The exhibition takes visitors back to the nomadic age 1,000 years ago. Showcasing the fabulous Mongolian deer stone animation created by the Centre for Applied Computing and Interactive Media (ACIM) at CityU, the exhibition recreates the serene yet mysterious forests of North China. What's more, visitors can enjoy interacting with CityU's new media artworks, including two original shaman costumes presented in 3D, as well as an iDome projection of a monumental 5th-century Buddha from the Yungang Grotto.

Guide

Dr Isabelle Frank is the Director of the Indra and Harry Banga Gallery, CityU. She received a doctorate in the history of art and architecture from Harvard University and a bachelor's degree in art and archaeology from Princeton University. She taught at Bard Graduate Center for Studies in the Decorative Arts before moving to academic administration, becoming associate dean for academic affair at The New School, and then dean at Fordham University's School of Professional and Continuing Studies.

SHAM SHUI PO A STORY OF GRASSROOTS HONG KONG with Paul C Y Chan of 'Walk In Hong Kong'

Sham Shui Po is home to some of Hong Kong's oldest street scenes with a vibrant and busy community. It houses a large concentration of public housing and in an ever changing Hong Kong, parts of this area remain relatively unchanged, today providing one of the most diverse areas where the city's poor and traders can make a living.

On a very hot July afternoon our group visited several sites which highlighted many aspects of Hong Kong grassroots life and their historical background. At each site Paul had stories to tell as we walked around Mei Ho House, the last remaining and refurbished block of the great Shek Kip Mei resettlement building programme following the great 1953 fire, the famous Garden Bakery which fed the community, the

former North Kowloon Magistracy where local justice was dispensed, and old style residential shops and walk up buildings in Yen Chow Street. The afternoon walk ended for many of us in a local café with welcome air conditioning and Turkish style refreshments.

LOCAL VISIT

A TOUR OF ROY DELBYCK'S COLLECTION

Roy Delbyck kindly allowed a small (but perfectly formed) group of five RAS HK members into his "Aladdin's Cave" for an informative peek into his collection of printed materials on China, Hong Kong, Taiwan and Macau from the last two centuries (as if that wasn't enough he also collects materials regarding the Chinese in the United States). This is just the first of what we hope will be several scheduled visits over the coming months into Roy's law office-cum-historical archive.

Roy emphasized to us that a "collector" is different from an "archivist", the latter usually keeping primary source documents that have accumulated over the course of an individual or organization's lifetime. Professional archivists (we had one amongst our small group) and historians generally understand archives to be records that have been naturally and necessarily generated as a product of regular legal, commercial, administrative, or social activities. In general, archives consist of records that have been selected for permanent or long-term preservation on grounds of their enduring cultural or historical value.

Collectors, like Roy, on the other hand are not "bound" to any single organization or individual, being free to decide what and how to collect. For Roy, cost is a restricting factor. He rarely undertakes outside conservation preferring to spend his funds to acquire the item rather than fix it up. Further, the "beat up"

look of a document tells us something of its journey in life, just as notations in a document's margins tell us something about the reader and the use of that document. Other collectors prefer their objects or documents to be in a pristine state.

Many are "born collectors" and Roy was no exception, starting as a child collecting baseball cards, stamps, and coins. Putting aside the collecting bug while raising his family, the collecting "genie" was let out of the bottle years a little over 10 years ago at the Asian Fine Art Fair in Hong Kong. Initially, he thought about collecting furniture, but turned to books and documents which proved much more convenient, affordable, and storable.

Focusing on the late 18th century onwards, Roy sees his "sweet spot" as a collector as the Republican era in China (especially Shanghai in the '20s and '30s), as well as materials about Hong Kong. Roy showed us his shelves of materials that highlighted the breadth and depth of his collection. By no means having a "completist" mindset, where every item in a series (like magazine issues) must be collected, Roy collected the interesting rather than the so-called "important", particularly if there is a story behind the piece that is a "value-added extra" like *Regulations of Hong Kong* (vol. 1, 1844-1900). This book was printed in Stanley Prison in 1938 under the direction of John Fraser, then Acting Attorney General Fraser was executed by the Japanese in World War II and awarded a George Cross for his heroism, In what turned out to be a cruel irony Fraser was tortured where the book was printed..

Roy talked to the group about the value of collecting "ephemera", the first meaning of the word in the *Merriam-Webster Dictionary* is of "something of no lasting significance", but also meaning "paper items (such as posters and tickets) that were originally meant to be discarded after use...". These often day-to-day items tell us more about the habits and ideas of society as a whole than what important documents do, although the latter obviously significantly changes lives.

Being previously informed about the particular interests of our small group, Roy had selected materials that especially resonated: items related to Catholic history, medicine, policing, and Cathay Pacific. An example of

items that we looked at were a notice by the Japanese for "enemy subjects" to gather in Hong Kong for internment in early January 1942, and a "disperse or we fire" Hong Kong police banner. Roy was unsure of the banner's

exact date, but some of us speculated it might have been used in the 1967 riots.

We could have spent much longer than the nearly two hours we were there. It was a great opportunity to have a vibrant discussion over history, also bringing our own knowledge to the table as well as RAS members have a wealth of knowledge about Asia and Hong Kong in particular. It was well worth the visit.

Roy will have another small group to visit his collection later in the year. Sign up quickly when the next visit is announced.





New Book Releases

Hong Kong Chronicles: Overview & Chronology The first Volume of the English Version

Hong Kong Chronicles consists of 54 volumes with 25 million words in 10 content categories, namely Overview, Chronology, Nature, Economy, Culture, Society, Politics, Notable People, Appendices and Special Topics.

Hong Kong Chronicles: Overview & Chronology comprising an "overview" on Hong Kong's local history and a "chronology" of more than 6,500 major historical events spanning 7,000 years - is the first volume in the first and largest translation project of any Chinese local chronicles in history.
