Message from your President, Helen Tinsley

Welcome to our July / August 2023 RASHK Newsletter.

I am sure that many of you have or will be taking welcome opportunities to travel over the summer period after three long years of Covid-19 related constraints. For those of you based in Hong Kong over the summer months we have continued to organize what I hope is a series of interesting events for you to enjoy. Please take a look at the programme we have prepared later on in this Newsletter.

The past couple of months has seen a rich range of activities in which maps featured prominently - firstly in a visit to the CUHK Library exhibition 'East meets West' as part of the 60th anniversary celebrations of the University's foundation, where our expert guide was Professor Stuart McManus, and then in a talk by HKUST Library's Dr Marco Caboara on his book related topic 'The Early Printed Western Maps of China'. I have ordered a copy of his book to be added to our RASHK Library collection. As mentioned in my previous Newsletter, in May we also took the opportunity to arrange a 'Celebration of the Life of Valery Garrett' who recently passed away. Earlier, she was a very active author, collector and member of RASHK's Activities Committee. The event was well attended, and many memories shared with her husband Richard. I'll share with him many of the photos taken that evening and also add some for our RASHK photo gallery.

In the coming two months we have some interesting events planned. Vaudine England will be talking about her book on Hong Kong history, *Fortune's Bazaar*. Local author Philip Snow has also kindly agreed to talk on his recent book *China and Russia*, highly topical at present, as I hope you agree. Vicky Lee is a member of our Activities Committee, but she is also a scholar of the Roman Catholic significant history and presence in Hong Kong. She will be talking about the history of the French order 'St Paul de Chartres' nuns in Hong Kong. For those of you who miss the visually stunning airplane arrivals and departures at Kai Tak Airport, Blue Lotus Gallery is hosting a photographic exhibition to celebrate the 25th Anniversary of Kai Tak's closure and we are in the process of hopefully arranging a July visit.

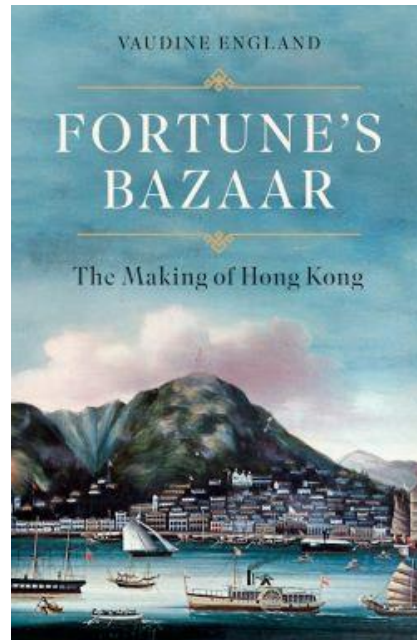

ONLINE TALK

Fortune's Bazaar: The Making of Hong Kong

Thursday • 6 July 2023



Details

Fortune's Bazaar is a story of empire, race and sex, and it offers startling insights into the ambiguous identity of Hong Kong to this day, just as its wonders may be changing forever.

A timely, well-researched, and vibrant new history of Hong Kong that reveals the untold stories of the diverse peoples who have made it a multicultural world metropolis - and whose lives are evolving today.

Hong Kong has always been many cities to many people: a seaport, a gateway to an empire, a place where fortunes can be dramatically made or lost, a place to disappear and reinvent oneself, and a mixing pot of diverse populations from literally everywhere around the globe. A British Crown Colony for 155 years, Hong Kong is now a Special Administrative Region of the People's Republic of China. Here, renowned journalist Vaudine England delves into Hong Kong's complex history and its people - diverse, multi-cultural, cosmopolitan - who have made this one-time fishing village into the world port city it is today.

Rather than a traditional history describing a town led by British Governors or a mere offshoot of a collapsing Chinese empire, *Fortune's Bazaar* is the first thorough examination of the varied peoples who made Hong Kong. While British traders and Asian merchants had long been busy in the Indian and South East Asian seas, there were many from different cultures and ethnic backgrounds who arrived in Hong Kong, met and married - despite all taboos - and created a distinct community.

Many of Hong Kong's most influential figures during its first century as a city were neither British nor Chinese - they were Malay or Indian, Jewish or Armenian, Parsi or Portuguese, Eurasian or Chindian - or simply, Hong Kongers. England describes those overlooked in history including the opium-traders who built synagogues or churches, ship-owners carrying gold-rush migrants, property tycoons, and more. Here, too, is the visionary who plumbed Hong Kong's harbour depths to spur reclamation, the half-Dutch Chinese gentleman with two wives who was knighted by Queen Victoria, and the landscape gardeners who settled Kowloon and became millionaires.

The Speaker

Vaudine England was a journalist for three decades in South East Asia and Hong Kong for the BBC, Reuters, the Far Eastern Economic Review and several London newspapers. Then she discovered the joys of history.

She has authored *The Quest of Noel Croucher - Hong Kong's Quiet Philanthropist*, *Kindred Spirits - a History of The Hong Kong Club*, *Arnholds - China Trader*, *Empire's Children - A Hong Kong Family*, and *Hari Harilela - Made in Hong Kong*. Her history of Hong Kong's formative first century, focused on the multiple peoples who came to build Asia's last port city — *Fortune's Bazaar*, *The Making of Hong Kong* — has been published by Scribner and Hachette in May 2023.

Based in Amsterdam, she is a research associate with the Hong Kong History Project in the UK, and a co-founding director of the archives and history-making consultancy, History Ink Limited. She brings her journalistic skills of investigative reporting and interviewing to delve deeply into the archives and the hidden stories of the past. Her work sheds new light on Hong Kong and its peoples in interesting times.

IN-PERSON TALK

Tracing the beginning works of Sainte Enfance (Holy Childhood) in Colonial Hong Kong: the Sisters of St. Paul de Chartres in Hong Kong (1848-1878)

Tuesday • 15 August 2023



Details

This talk will begin by briefly looking into some of the issues of female infanticide and child abandonment in China in the 1800s. What were the reactions of foreign missionaries and local Chinese literati? What was the perception of these Chinese abandoned infants in Europe as these stories of female infanticide and abandonment travelled back to Europe? What was the Catholic theological position on unbaptized dying babies in those days? What prompted the establishment of the Holy Childhood Association? How did the Holy Childhood establish itself in Hong Kong in the late 1840s? What were some of experiences of the French Sisters of St. Paul De Chartres as they began their work in the newly established British Colony in the face of war, disease, terrorism, political turmoil, and persecutions prompted by underlying anti-foreign sentiments?

The Speaker

Dr. Vicky Lee is currently an External Consultant for the HKBU Centre for Teaching and Learning. Her publications cover issues of race, interraciality and war memoirs in Hong Kong. Her seminal work *Being Eurasian: Memories across Racial Divides* (HKU Press, 2004) was on interraciality in wartime Hong Kong. In recent years, she had contributed a number of papers at the Annual Conferences on HK Catholic History sponsored by CUHK Centre for Catholic Studies and Hong Kong Diocese Archives. These include *Sacraments in Hostile Environments: the Siege of Hong Kong December 8-25, 1941 and COVID-19 of 2020* (published in the *Conference Proceedings of the History of Hong Kong Catholic Church in the 20th Century*, April 2021), *Tracing the beginning works of Sainte Enfance (Holy Childhood) in Colonial Hong Kong* (Conference Proceedings in press). And recently on June 25, 2023, she had also contributed a paper entitled *Research as Detective Work: deciphering the historical Blue Books and Government Reports to unravel the History of Catholic Schools in Hong Kong*.

IN-PERSON TALK

Special collections and archival materials in the Hong Kong Baptist University Library

Saturday • 19 August 2023



Details

This talk will showcase the flagship special collection in the Hong Kong Baptist University Library, namely, the Archives on the History of Christianity in China.

Established in 1996, this collection now comprises over 8,500 volumes, 29,000 microform items, pictorial materials as well as archival materials. With some books dating back to the early 19th century, the focus of the collection is on the history of Protestantism in China and the impact on the Chinese society and culture, although history of the Catholic Church in China is also covered.

In the last two decades the collection has grown steadily with materials about the history and development of Christianity in Hong Kong, especially in the post-WWII period.

The Speaker

Wan Yu WONG is the Special Collections and Archives Librarian at the Hong Kong Baptist University Library. Her work involves building, promoting, and enhancing access to the collection.

Prior to taking up this position in mid-2021 most of her librarian career was with the National Library of Australia, including overseeing their digitization program for seven years.

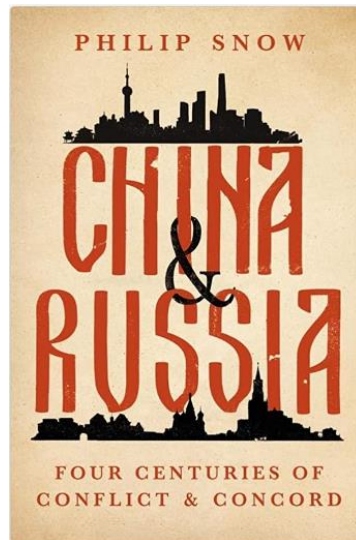

ONLINE TALK

China and Russia:

Four Centuries of Conflict and Concord

Thursday • 24 August 2023



Philip Snow will be giving a talk based on his recently published book, *China and Russia: Four Centuries of Conflict and Concord*.

Details

Russia and China, the largest and most populous countries in the world, respectively, have maintained a delicate relationship for four centuries. In addition to a four-thousand-kilometre border, they have periodically shared a common outlook on political and economic affairs. But they are, in essence, profoundly different polities and cultures, and their intermittent alliances have proven difficult and at times even volatile.

Philip Snow provides a full account of the relationship between these two global giants. Looking at politics, religion, economics, and culture, Snow uncovers the deep roots of the two nations' alignment. We see the shifts in the balance of power, from the wealth and strength of early Qing China to the Tsarist and Soviet ascendancies, and episodes of intense conflict followed by harmony. He looks too at the experiences and opinions of ordinary people, which often vastly differed from those of their governments, and considers how long the countries' current amicable relationship might endure.

The Speaker

Philip Snow has travelled extensively in Russia and China since the 1960s and has lived in Hong Kong since 1994. An expert in China's international relations, he is the author of *The Star Raft: China's Encounter with Africa* and *The Fall of Hong Kong*.

Exhibition: Bringing Together China and the West: Books of Early Modern Western Sinology

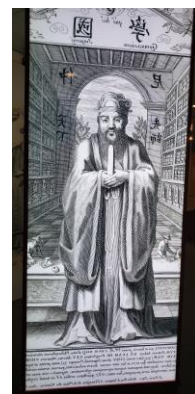

CUHK has been celebrating the 60th Anniversary of its foundation, and this exhibition was envisioned as part of these celebrations. The University's foundation vision was to create links between the past and the present, as well as East and West. Prior to the late nineteenth century, during a long time span between Ming and early Qing dynasties, it is notable that linkages between two great traditions were on a much more equal footing, characterized by mutual respect, understanding of common humanity and a European fascination for knowledge about China. Using CUHK Library's growing collection of rare books, this exhibition has illustrated how the geographical and cultural distances between China and Europe were bridged.



Many of these precious volumes were written by famous Catholic missionaries, such as Matteo Ricci (1552-1610) and Johann Adam Schell (1591-1666), followed by lay and Protestant authors writing in the eighteenth century. The rare books and carefully chosen images on display helped to highlight the overlapping and connected backgrounds in six main areas of knowledge in the study of geography, culture and philosophy, arts and humanities, religion, Chinese medicine, maths, science and engineering. In many ways these knowledge areas mirror the modern faculties and departments of CUHK.



Our visit was very ably led by Professor Stuart McManus who highlighted key points in many of the six beautiful and rare groups of exhibits on display and was ready to answer all of the queries from the knowledgeable and interested group of RASHK members who attended. Our tour extended well past the originally planned time frame. A wonderfully illustrated catalogue of this exhibition will be added to our RASHK Library in due course and, for those who would like to attend in person, the exhibition is open until 20 August 2023.

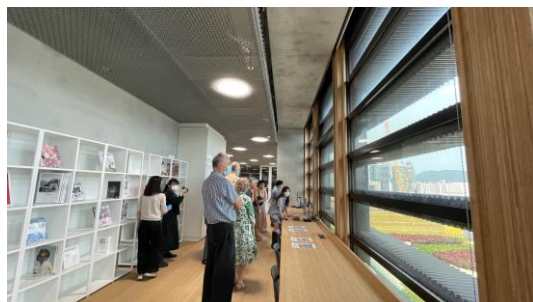
LOCAL VISIT

M+ Research Centre – Mr. C.M. Yip, M+ Museum Archives and Library Team

Tuesday • 1 June 2023

Our RASHK Honorary Archivist, C M Yip, is the M+ Museum Collection Archivist and leads the Archives and Library Team there, as well as overseeing the M+ Research Centre. He very kindly agreed to host a visit for our members, which was much appreciated and welcomed by the group who attended.

M+ Museum is a large and impressive recent addition to Hong Kong's cultural resources and expertise, situated on a magnificent harbour site. We met in the lobby which was busy with many visitors and staff. Many of our RASHK group



who attended have already visited various exhibitions there, but on this occasion, we were privileged to be hosted on the 5/F, where CM Yip and



his team are based and where their spacious office area has wonderful harbour views. This team performs an important role in managing various collections and providing support for the

Museum's operations, exhibitions, publications and programmes.

Our group was briefed on the scope of work undertaken at M+ by CM Yip, with introduction to his team of young professionals who hold a wide range of expertise. We had a chance to examine on site some of the archived materials and admire from a distance the very large and well-equipped storage building situated nearby, where items currently not on display are safely held.

We were also introduced to the work of the Research Centre which provides access by appointment to collections for researchers, scholars, students, and the public.



This visit gave us much insight into the work and development of M+ Museum, a very important and relatively new addition to Hong Kong's cultural landscape. We wish the whole team well in their future endeavours to help put Hong Kong's museums on the global map.

Maps of China: Treasure Hunts Around the World

Dr. Marco Caboara, Head of the Special Collections, the Digital Scholarship and Archives Manager at Hong Kong University of Science and Technology (HKUST) Lee Shau Kee Library gave a talk and shared his journey of turning the antique maps of China into a book, *Regnum Chinae: The Printed Western Maps of China to 1735*, which was published in October 2022.

Little has been written about maps of China before, the only precedent in English being *China in European Maps*, published twenty years ago precisely by this prestigious university thanks to its first librarian Min-min Chang. The book is one of the highlights of HKUST's 'Western Maps of China Project', which started 10 years ago when the Library acquired a large collection of antique maps of China. With the generous funding from Dr. Winnie KO Pui Shuen, an HKUST Honorary Fellow, the collection was digitized, and the team went on to turn it into a book.

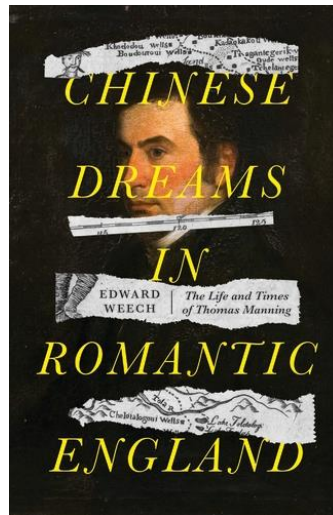
