Message from your President, Helen Tinsley

Welcome to our November/ December 2023 RASHK Newsletter.

We had a busy couple of months for our summer RASHK activities, which continued in September and October with some more interesting events. Highlights included talks by Prof. Alan Smart based on his recent book, which charted the background to the history and successful removal of most hillside squatter dwellings in Hong Kong, a few of which still remain. A team from the Hong Kong History Centre (formerly the Hong Kong History Project) based at the UK's Bristol University was recently in Hong Kong, led by Centre Co-Director, Prof. Robert Bickers, with its focus mainly on the fostering of research and collaboration.

We took the opportunity to invite Centre Co-Director, Dr. Vivian Kong to present her work on the 1910-1945 history of Multiracial Britishness in Hong Kong at an in-person talk at Café 8. Those who attended enjoyed a lively follow-up Q&A session. I have ordered a copy of her soon-to-be published book for our RASHK Library if you'd like to know more. Another of their team members, Dr. Thomas Larkin, will also be talking to us at RASHK in November on the history of the Heard family in China and Hong Kong.

Despite concerns about the weather, many of our members thoroughly enjoyed a fascinating and relatively rain-free tour of the work of Kadoorie Farm and Botanic Garden. A report on our visit is available later in this Newsletter. At the time of writing, we can still look forward to Prof. Lai's 30th October talk on Daoism and his comprehensive documentation of Hong Kong stele monuments.

Please also take a look at our programme of events planned for November and December 2023 and I will look forward to meeting some of you then. As always, your feedback on events and ideas for future activities are welcome. One small point to note is that our previously planned November visit to a Hakka village house in Pak Sha O has been deferred.

One final news of importance is the recent decision by our RASHK Council to award the RASHK Honorary Fellowship to Dr. Colin Day in recognition of his very significant contribution to the RASHK related work of the Sir Lindsay and Lady May Ride Memorial Fund, in support of the Hong Kong Studies Series of books (now more than 35 publications). In the recent past, RASHK Honorary Fellowships have also been awarded to John Strickland and Stephen Davies in grateful recognition of their important contributions to our Society and its work. Congratulations to them all.

LOCAL VISIT

Walking in North Point Exploring British Colonial Influences and Its Blend of Unique Cultures

Thursday • 2 November 2023

Details

North Point presents a unique world of its own, offering an intriguing blend of history and culture. Strolling along King's Road, one immediately observes the absence of British colonial influences, except for the road name, while embracing the distinctive social character that defines the area.

Historically, North Point has served as a refuge for those fleeing war and unrest, with numerous "temporary" halfway houses established during the mid-20th century evolving into permanent residences for immigrants from Shanghai, Fujian, as well as overseas Chinese hailing from the Philippines and Indonesia. Over time, these diverse groups have shaped the captivating cultural mosaic that now defines this northernmost enclave of Hong Kong Island.

It is easy to overlook North Point's past as a vibrant entertainment hub and a pivotal industrial center in the city, as the forces of modernization led to the gradual decline of these pillars of local life, starting in the 1980s. Furthermore, some of the dilapidated structures in the area played significant roles in the tumultuous clashes between the British colonial government and leftist factions during the 1967 riots. Despite its unassuming layout, North Point is brimming with compelling stories and distinctive urban vistas that vividly illustrate the complex dynamics and often paradoxical underpinnings of this metropolis.

Our tour will also encompass an overview of the iconic State Theatre, the oldest surviving standalone theater in Hong Kong Island. This historic venue now stands as a vital and captivating conservation project, and we will gladly share our experiences from our involvement in its conservation advocacy.

The Speakers

Paul C.Y. Chan holds a Bachelor of Laws Degree and a Postgraduate Certificate in Laws from the University of Hong Kong, a Master of Philosophy from the Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK), and a Master of Science Degree in Comparative Politics from the London School of Economics and Political Science.

He was once a part-time lecturer at the Department of Government and Public Administration at CUHK, Political Assistant to Secretary for Food and Health, HKSAR Government (2008 to 2012) and a presenter and commentator at Radio Television Hong Kong.

Paul is also a founding member of the Roundtable group and Co-founder & CEO of Walk In Hong Kong, a cultural enterprise that curates immersive and memorable experiences. He is also involved in the conservation campaign of the State Theatre in North Point, Former Service Reservoir in Bishop Hill, and recently 190 Nathan Road in Tsim Sha Tsui.

ONLINE TALK

A global-microhistory of Augustine Heard & Company in the 19th Century

Thursday • 16 November 2023

Details

In the nineteenth century, Augustine Heard & Co. became the most influential among those American firms involved in trade with China.

Founded in 1840 following a rift between partners of Russell & Co., Augustine Heard & Co. rapidly became the second largest American trading firm in China. The firm expanded operations throughout China's treaty ports, its partners witnessing first-hand many of the defining moments of Sino-Western contact during the nineteenth century. But by 1876 the firm had failed, the Heard brothers retreating from China to pursue new interests in Europe in the United States. Still, in the course of their enterprise, the brothers generated a massive amount of material describing life and commerce on the China coast.

Applying an innovative global-microhistorial approach to the history of the firm's partners, Dr Thomas Larkin's research uses the case study of this company to explore the ways American merchants were shaped by their experiences living and trading within both the British and Qing empires. It in turn explores the various ways these merchants were active participants in Britain's imperial project in China.

The Speaker



Dr. Thomas M. Larkin is the Hong Kong History Centre Fellow at the University of Bristol, Department of History. His research interests include nineteenth-century Anglo-American and Sino-American social and cultural interactions in China, and the critical application of global-microhistorical, transimperial, and digital methodologies.

Dr. Larkin's forthcoming monograph, *The China Firm: American Elites and the Making of British Colonial Society*, will be published by Columbia University Press in Spring

2024. *The China Firm* traces the rise and fall of the American firm Augustine Heard & Co. to disentangle the symbiotic relationship between American elites and the British imperial/colonial project in China. The book considers the negotiated processes whereby Americans adapted to or rejected British colonial culture as they sought to carve out a place amongst the foreign elite living and trading along the China coast. He recently completed the British-Academy funded 'Mapping Sino-Foreign Networks and Mobility in China' digital project, and his work has been published in *Cultural and Social History*, the *Historical Journal*, *Gender and History*, and the *Pacific Historical Review*.



Village Scholars in the New Territories and Their Book Collections by Dr. Patrick Hase



Dr. Patrick H. Hase is a part-time lecturer at Lingnan University, Hong Kong. He is also the past President and Honorary Fellow of the Royal Asiatic Society, Hong Kong Branch; Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries of London; Honorary Advisor to the Museums Service, Leisure and Cultural Services Department, Government of Hong Kong; Honorary Advisor to the People's Government of Shenzhen (Zhongying Street History Museum) China; Honorary Advisor to the People's Government, Kaiping Municipality, China; and Chairman of the History Department Advisory Board, Lingnan University, Hong Kong. He is a prominent scholar in his field and the author of The Six-Day War of 1899: Hong Kong in the Age of Imperialism (2008); Custom Land and Livelihood in Rural South China: The Traditional Land Law of Hong Kong's New Territories, 1750–1950 (2013); and Forgotten Heroes: San On County and its Magistrates in the Late Ming and Early Qing (2017). Dr. Patrick Hase will deliver a talk based on his recent study and article published in Volume 63 of our RASHK Journal.

He will also take this opportunity to pay tribute on the recent passing of Dr. James W. Hayes (1930-2023), former RASHK President (1983-1990) and scholar who, over a several decades, contributed many books and journals to our knowledge of life in rural Hong Kong. His obituary is included in JRASK Volume 63. James Hayes was a wide-ranging scholar, exceling in recording numerous aspects of Hong Kong history, culture and society. He worked in Hong Kong's New Territories for almost half of his thirty-two years of government service and was Regional Secretary in charge of district administration there in 1985–87.



ONLINE TALK

George Forrest, a Scottish plant collector in China

Details

Leonie Paterson, Archivist at the Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh (RBGE) will be speaking about George Forrest (1873 – 1932), a Scottish botanist, who became one of the first western explorers to the remote southwestern province of Yunnan, generally regarded as the most biodiverse province in China.

Forrest made seven botanical collecting expeditions to Yunnan in southwest China between 1904 and his death there in 1932, collecting samples and seeds for study and for avid collectors willing to pay for species new to the U.K. to add to their collections. During his career he added over 31,000 pressed and dried plant specimens to the RBGE herbarium and would also send seeds of the most desirable so they could be introduced to British gardens including primulas, rhododendrons, gentians, pieris and iris, many of them named after him using the epithet *forrestii*. Forrest's botanical specimens are also held at herbaria around the world, most notably at the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, the Royal Horticultural Society, London, the Beijing and Kunming Institutes of Botany and the Hong Kong Herbarium.

How did he manage to collect such a vast range of plants? And what parts of his story do we often not get to hear?

The Speaker



Leonie Paterson, Archivist at the Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh (RBGE), who has been working in the Archives at the Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh for over 23 years. Not being a botanist, she finds herself drawn more to the stories of the individuals who created the records she looks after, in particular those of the plant collector George Forrest and his mentor, the Regius Keeper or Director of the RBGE at the turn of the 20th century, Sir Isaac Bayley Balfour. Reading Forrest's

letters are, to her, as if she's receiving emails from him today – his voice comes through clearly and has opened up a fascinating new world of travel, experiences, risk and intrigue. She's currently in the process of cataloguing the Forrest archives in order to make them more accessible.





LOCAL VISIT

Nature Discovery in Kadoorie Farm and Botanic Garden

Thursday • 19 October 2023

Our group left Pier 9, Central at 12.45 pm in an almost full 27-seater minibus. The weather was warm and overcast as we left, with a hint of rain (or hopefully, just drizzle). The traffic was in our favour at this time of day and the journey on virtually empty roads took scarcely 30 minutes. Leaving our bus at the KFBG drop off point, we walked up a flight of steep steps to Reception, then on to the podium level beyond, where our two-hour tour of the lower area of the farm began at 2 pm. Divided into two groups, led by our most accomplished and charming volunteer guides (docents) Lucia and Ruby, we ascended the site by steep paths and steeper flights of steps, turning off to one side or the other as we reached the various animal and bird enclosures.

Our first stop was by a young incense tree in the centre of the podium. Incense trees were once abundant in Hong Kong, but the natural stock is constantly under threat of illegal poaching by organised crime gangs, even within KFBG's remote forest areas. Several levels of protection are in place at the farm, including building steel cages around the trees and, for the podium tree, CCTV.

Leaving the podium, we passed by a statue of the farm's founder Sir Horace Kadoorie, resting comfortably on a park bench, as we walked up to and along a path taking us past the **Farm Museum and Shop** and a row of pig sties. When the farm was founded in 1956, principal focus was on helping poor farmers in the New Territories. Pig breeding and livestock improvement were a major part of the work until 1995. The farm still has a few chubby Da Hua Bai pigs in the pig sties in memory of those days, but these fat pigs, bred in the past for local taste, are for viewing, not eating.

We walked down through the **Eco-garden**, a self-contained organic garden where it is shown how the elements needed for successful gardening can be achieved naturally. This garden is also used as a

demonstration site for people who are starting local community gardens. Notices posted by the various plots dispense hints for new gardeners. (The leafy green veggies looked tasty.)



From here we moved on to various enclosures housing animals and birds which have been rescued as infants, arrived injured or were saved from the food and pet trade. In the **Piers Jacobs Wildlife Sanctuary** we saw muntjac (barking deer), and fruit bats roosting hidden under palm leaf shelters they had built. The two little female deer were rescued when their mother died and, having been raised by humans, they lack the survival skills they would need to be released back to the wild.

Walking along past the **Raptor Roost**, we saw large birds of prey that were rehabilitated after injury. Even behind firm netting, the eagles towering above us on their branches looked large and alarming.

In the **Amphibian and Reptile House** we admired a splendid green tree python, coiled neatly around a thick branch front top right of its enclosure. We could not see its head, as it had coiled itself to face away from passersby, but a later online image search revealed that the pythons position their heads centrally, with their coils neatly arranged either side.

Then it was on to the **Insect House**. While lacking the dramatic visual appeal of animals and birds, insects are important components in the balance of nature, performing many vital functions. Displays included working bee and termite nests illustrating the well-ordered lives of these social little creatures.

Parrots are popular as pets but are long-lived and require a great deal of care. Many parrots end up abandoned by their owners. In the past KFBG has received abandoned and stray parrots and these are now cared for at the **Parrot Sanctuary**. The separately housed sulphur-crested cockatoos put on an excited and very noisy display for our visit. Two large, brightly coloured macaws in a separate enclosure across the way looked on silently.

We continued on down past the **Wildlife Walkthrough**, pausing to admire some brightly coloured American flamingos, survivors of a flock gifted from South America over 25 years ago and now approaching their senior years (life expectancy in captivity is around 40). Tiring, we decided against a detour to see the monkeys, instead continuing on to the **Farm Shop and Museum** for a quick inspection and some purchases before finishing our tour at the **Sun Garden Animal Exhibit**, which displays animals rescued from the wild animal trade (including cute marmosets).



There was time for a refuelling stop at the adjacent **Eat Well Café**, where items enthusiastically consumed by our group included Masala ginger tea, chickpea quinoa salad, and raw, nutty energy balls.

Then we were on our way back to town in our trusty minibus, after a splendidly informative, interesting and energetic countryside outing.


The University of Bristol Launches The Hong Kong History Centre
