## Message from your President, Helen Tinsley

Welcome to our September/ October 2023 RASHK Newsletter.

I know that many of you have taken this opportunity to travel outside Hong Kong during summer and catch up with family and friends. For those of you who stayed in Hong Kong we have continued to organize what I hope is a series of interesting talks and local visits. Pictures and reports on these activities are available in this Newsletter. A big thank you to those who had contributed to this Newsletter!

Over the last few months, we have arranged visits to a couple of photographic exhibitions. One was kindly hosted by Sarah Greene at the Blue Lotus Gallery, to celebrate the 25th Anniversary of the move of the Hong Kong International from Kai Tak to Chep Lap Kok in 1998. One of the photographers responsible, Greg Girard linked up with us from Canada via Zoom, and shared many of his favourite photoshoots of the airport, especially the dramatic plane take offs and landings as if they were about to touch the surrounding buildings in Kowloon City. Despite the tremendous noise, these happenings were much appreciated by our local community, and always admired by visitors. Ed Stokes hosted a visit to his section of a recent 3-man exhibition at HKU Library, celebrating the ‘Colours of Hong Kong’. His section is about the story of his own development as a photographer and the challenges faced in capturing that special image for posterity, focusing particularly on Hong Kong’s stunning landscapes.

Our third recent visit was to the Hong Kong Baptist University’s Library and Archives Section which, since 1996 has been gathering a collection of books, papers and journals documenting the rich history of Protestant Christianity in Hong Kong and South China, and is now in the process of digitization.

For talks over the past couple of months, author Vaudine England introduced us to many of the diverse characters who contributed so much to Hong Kong’s development, in her book ‘Fortune’s Bazaar’. Prof Helen Siu shared with us her wisdom and historical perspectives of China’s changes over the years and Hong Kong’s cross border dynamics, drawing on her book ‘Tracing China: A Forty Year Ethnographic Journey’—an approach that ‘looks for plum blossoms in the snow’ in her field research. Dr. Vicky Lee is a member of our Activities Committee, but is also a scholar of Roman Catholic history in Hong Kong, and she shared with us some of the local history of St. Paul de Chartres and their care for abandoned babies. It was great to see members from the local community in the audience that evening. So much of the foundation of Hong Kong’s existing education, health care and social welfare sections have their roots in the work of religious orders that came to Hong Kong in the 1800s.

Philip Snow’s talk, based on his recent book, was a true eye-opening review of the 400-year shifting relationship between China and Russia, giving us fresh perspective on these two global powers.

We note with sadness the passing in Australia of James Hayes, former President of RASHK, in July. An obituary will be included in our JRASHK and our sincere condolences have been sent to his family.

Please take a look later in this newsletter at future events planned for the next couple of months and I look forward to seeing many of you there, either in person or via zoom. The dates for some planned events will be finalized soon. As always, your feedback is welcome.

One small point to note is that we are no longer using a RASHK mobile phone for contact purposes, effective immediately. 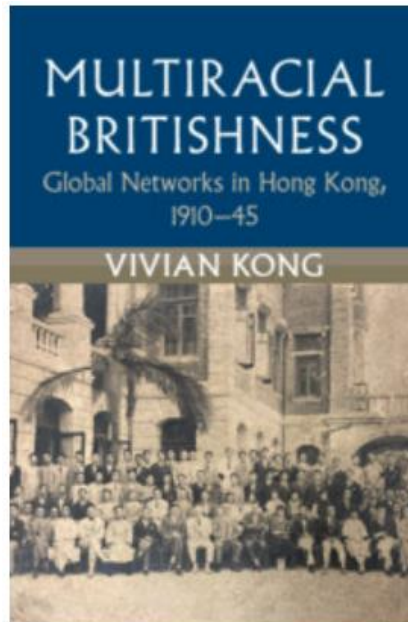

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**IN-PERSON TALK**

**Multiracial Britishness: Global Networks in Hong Kong, 1910-45**

**Wednesday • 20 September 2023**



**Details**

What does it mean to be British? To answer this, *Multiracial Britishness* takes us to an underexplored site of Britishness – the former British colony of Hong Kong. Vivian Kong asks how colonial hierarchies, the racial and cultural diversity of the British Empire, and global ideologies complicate the meaning of being British. Using multi-lingual sources and oral history, Kong traces the experiences of multiracial residents in 1910-45 Hong Kong.

Guiding us through Hong Kong's global networks, and the colony's co-existing exclusive and cosmopolitan social spaces, this book uncovers the long history of multiracial Britishness. Kong argues that Britishness existed in the colony in multiple, hyphenated forms – as a racial category, but also as privileges, a means of survival, and a form of cultural and national belonging. This book offers us an important reminder that multiracial inhabitants of the British Empire were just as active in the making of Britishness as the British state and white Britons.

### **The Speaker**

Born and raised in Hong Kong, Vivian Kong is a social historian of colonial Hong Kong and the Co-Director of the newly founded Hong Kong History Centre at the University of Bristol.

Her research to-date has focused on Hong Kong and its transnational connections, and she has published on migration, identities, and civil society in interwar Hong Kong. She is now working on a new book project about a Eurasian woman who was born in Hong Kong, grew up in Cornwall, worked in London, and died in Singapore.

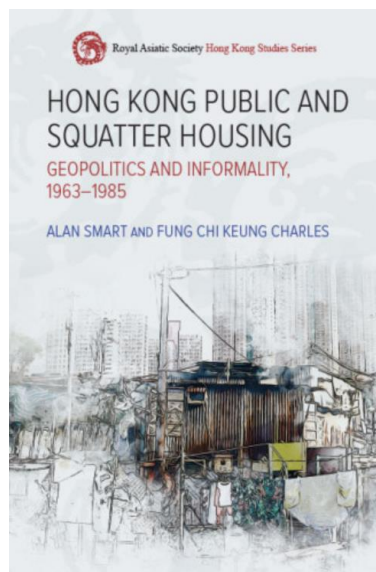

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ONLINE TALK

**Hong Kong Public and Squatter Housing:  
Geopolitics and Informality, 1963–1985**

Thursday • 12 October 2023



**Details**

Alan Smart will be giving a talk based on his recently published book, *Hong Kong Public and Squatter Housing: Geopolitics and Informality, 1963–1985*, which was co-authored with Charles Chi-keung Fung.

Informality, particularly squatting and street vending, was pervasive in Hong Kong until the 1980s. After four decades of failing to end new squatting after the Second World War, and with their numbers climbing to over 750,000 in 1982, the colonial Hong Kong government finally succeeded after 1984. Informality, and the tactics used to control it, had a huge impact on the social and economic landscape of the colony. Based on extensive archival research and my own ethnographic research in the 1980s, Alan Smart considers various explanations of how and why new squatting was finally ended. In doing so, some new perspectives on public housing and migration management are offered.

The authors, Alan Smart and Charles Chi-keung Fung, trace two decades of the development of squatting in Hong Kong. They reconstruct the government policy on squatting through both ethnographic and archival research. They argued that the management of squatter resettlement had a massive impact on the



development of Hong Kong's public housing system and more generally on the landscape and social organization of late colonial and contemporary Hong Kong.

Overall, Smart and Fung make an important contribution to the understanding of how public housing and squatting interacted in influential ways that have been poorly understood and offer new perspectives on the challenges of urban governance and housing problems.

### The Speaker

ALAN SMART is a Professor Emeritus in the Dept. of Anthropology and Archaeology at University of Calgary, Calgary, Canada. PhD in Social Anthropology from University of Toronto (1986). Research interests include political economy, housing, urban anthropology, anthropology of law, borders, zoonotic diseases, smart cities and posthumanism.



Field research conducted in Hong Kong, China and Canada. Author of *Making Room: Squatter Clearance in Hong Kong*, *The Shek Kip Mei Myth: Squatters, Fires, and Colonial Rule*, *Posthumanism: Anthropological Perspectives* (co-author Josephine Smart), *Hong Kong Public and Squatter Housing: Informality and Geopolitics, 1963-1985* (with Charles Chi-keung Fung, in press) and numerous book chapters and articles.

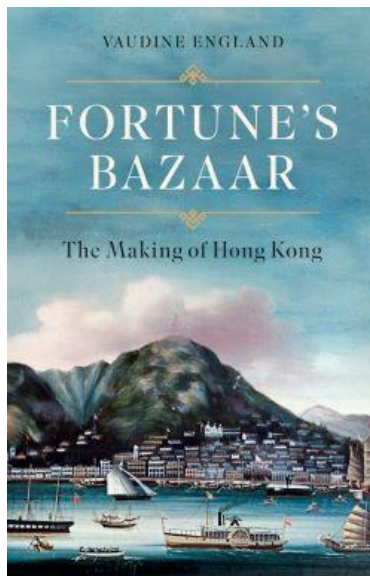

For so many years, Kai Tak Airport was such an important and much remembered icon of Hong Kong life, that its closure in 1998 was a significant event in our city's history, despite its replacement with a brand new, spacious, and modern airport at Chek Lap Kok. This exhibition celebrated Kai Tak Airport's legacy and contribution to our local cultural identity. Who can forget the noise and drama of airplane take-offs and landings over the harbour in the midst of our crowded city, and the challenges it presented for all flight crews?!

The exhibition featured impressive photographs by Canadian photographer Greg Girard and local photojournalist Birdy Chu. Greg Girard joined us by Zoom to showcase a wonderful collection of his favourite Kai Tak photos. Also shown was a video recording of a typical landing at Kai Tak from a pilot's perspective.

For many of us who attended this exhibition, it brought back many memories of flights into and out of Hong Kong in the pre-1998 days, and for those who were in Hong Kong after that date...these dramatic take-offs and landings right above our crowded buildings are very much in our collective memory.

# The Colours of Hong Kong Photo Exhibition Curator's Tour

Our in-person tour was part of a three-photographer exhibition, our focus being on the natural history section and led by Ed Stokes (the other sections featured Cantonese opera and local street scenes on separate floors were by other photographers).

Ed shared with us the concepts and methods behind photo story-telling, as well as the personal and creative links he felt between Australia and Hong Kong. The framing of photo places, use of optimum local light, and equipment challenges faced when filming landscapes were shown. The process often began with a map. In many ways, his

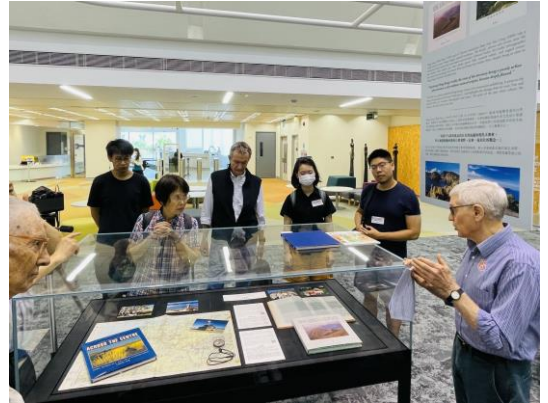


previous work in Australia (his



home country) served as a springboard for his later work in Hong Kong. Featured in the exhibition were photos taken for his acclaimed 1995 book, 'Hong Kong's Wild Places' – a highly researched recording of our landscape and ecology.

This led to further exploring, recording, and photographing much more of Hong Kong, many impressive examples of which were exhibited in 'Colours of Hong Kong'. There was also an opportunity to reflect on the rapid changes in our local landscape, and in photography techniques. Most phones now have a photography function, but expert skill remains essential to framing a historical photograph.

These archives host a very large collection of materials that document the history of Protestant Christianity in China, including Hong Kong. It was established in 1996 and contains >8500 volumes, nearly 30,000 microfilm items, and pictorial materials. A careful programme of digitalization is in progress. Some items date back to the early 19<sup>th</sup> century.

Ms. Wong provided us with a detailed written timeline of Christianity in Hong Kong and shared with us some of the rich materials documenting biographies of missionaries, Chinese Christians, and church leaders, as well as the history of various missions in China since the 19<sup>th</sup> century, such as American and European mission boards, the Methodist Church, the Church Mission Society, and the London Missionary Society. These include both personal papers and organizational records. The collection includes many multifaceted publications covering the flourishing local church scene post-WWII in Hong Kong, Macau, and Taiwan, and the wide-ranging Christian contributions to our local education, health care, and social welfare developments for a rapidly expanding and energetic population.

This was the first visit by RASHK members to this generously hosted local resource, and our group included a local PhD student to help in her research. We did not have enough time to take a look at the papers donated by former legislator Elsie Tu; perhaps that will be the topic of another visit in the future.
