LOCAL VISIT

Heritage Tour at The University of Chicago Campus in Hong Kong's Mount Davis

Saturday • 2 March 2024



Details

The University of Chicago Francis and Rose Yuen Campus in Hong Kong which opened in 2018, was built on a historically important site at Mount Davis, Pokfulam. The Chicago complex won the prestigious Prix Versailles international design.)

Converted from the heritage building, Block B Annex and the entry courtyard, it became the Hong Kong Jockey Club University of Chicago Heritage Courtyard and Interpretation Centre (HCIC). The Chicago complex is currently a regional hub for ambitious research, education and collaboration and an important addition to the University's international presence and engagement.

The Mount Davis Fort was one of the largest coastal defence batteries in Hong Kong and was first operational in 1911. It saw extensive actions during the Battle of Hong Kong (8th – 25th December 1941). The existing relics include artillery batteries, lookout, barracks and training field etc. The Mount Davis Battery was rated Grade 2 historic building in 2009.

The revitalized Grade 3 heritage buildings, namely Blocks A, B and B Annex, and the preserved exterior heritage elements (the battery and the magazine), as well as heritage trails all together projects the unique history of the Mount Davis site.

Visitors can also appreciate the full view of Lamma Island and West Lamma Channel from the campus.



In-Person Talk

Example 2.1 Incarcerated Women - Hong Kong's Women's Prison and its Occupants

Wednesday • 6 March 2024



Details

In response to International Women's Day (8th March), this talk is on the history of Women's Prison in Hong Kong and those who lived and worked inside Victoria Gaol and successor in Lai Chi Kok.

While women were filling the magistrates courts and prisons of the British Isles during the 19th century, a female criminal in Hong Kong was a rarity. Yet, often because of grinding poverty, some did find themselves on the wrong side of the law.

Petty crimes - small-time thieving, illegal hawking or the possession of small amounts of illegal opium, etc - account for most of the appearances in court, but more heinous ones, often with a Hong Kong flavour, also feature. Making use of what was to hand, arguments were conducted with the aid of meat choppers, and why stop at one or two chops, when 70 seems like such a nice round number?

The trade in children, especially young girls, often involving kidnapping, was an easy and lucrative one for women to pursue, and punished by the courts accordingly. Not that all the women in front of the magistrates were Chinese, by any means: certain Western women were quite capable of attracting notoriety and worse.

The talk will reveal day-to-day life in the small Women's Prison, and the stories of the Matrons - the women who had charge of the prisoners. It will recount, too, how the British justice system tried to cope with the challenges the situation presented, and life in the small Women's Prison, where a minority of the defendants would 'do time'.

The Speaker



Patricia O'Sullivan started researching Hong Kong's vibrant history in 2010, initially uncovering long-forgotten family stories for Policing Hong Kong - an Irish History (Blacksmith Books, Hong Kong 2017). Based in the UK, she tries to spend a few months of each year in Hong Kong, and is currently researching her next book, on the city's connections with World War One.

She has written many articles on forgotten aspects of the city's life, some of which are to be found on her website, www.socialhistoryhk.com. Women, Crime and

the Courts: Hong Kong 1841-1941, which contains the fuller story of the Women's Prison here, was published by Blacksmith Books in 2020.



IN-PERSON TALK

Who in these 1880s-1950s photos called Hong Kong 'home'?

Thursday • 14 March 2024



Details

David's latest book shows photos of the wide variety of people you'd meet in Hong Kong in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, and looks at who among them called Hong Kong 'home'. In this talk he'll show us their photos and explain how he answered the question. We'll also hear several people's stories that didn't make it into the book.

Each photo has been scanned at high resolution, so David can zoom in to show us its hidden details. He'll use these details as clues to piece together the stories behind each scene.

This is a richly illustrated talk, using photos from David's latest book and from earlier books in the series, plus other photos from his collection that haven't been shown before.

The talk will last approximately 45 minutes, followed by Q&A.

This will be David's last in-person talk for RASHK before he relocates to the UK in July.

The Speaker



David Bellis runs the award-winning Gwulo.com website, home to over 50,000 pages about Hong Kong's history, including over 35,000 photos. He also gives regular illustrated talks, and has published a series of books showing photos from his collection and telling their stories: *Old Hong Kong Photos and The Tales They Tell*. The fifth and final volume in the series was published in December.

Originally from Wales, David first visited Hong Kong in 1989, and has lived here since 1992.

Ex-Sham Shui Po Service Reservoir Guided Tour

Thursday • 21 March 2024



Details

The Ex-Sham Shui Po Service Reservoir (Ex-SSPSR), aka Bishop Hill Reservoir, was accorded a Grade 1 historical building status by the Antiquities Advisory Board in June 2021.

The Water Supplies Department (WSD) has been launching guided tours of the service reservoir with a view to enhance public's understanding of the historical background and appreciate the internal structure of the Ex-SSPSR, so as to increase public's awareness on conservation of historic waterworks building and heritage.

Located underground, the structure reflects the romantic ancient Roman attitudes to architecture. Its remarkable structure offers a precious glimpse of Hong Kong's water supply history over the past hundred years.

Visit to Tangkou Community Project and Some Heritage Areas at Kaiping, China

Details

Kaiping, (Hoiping) in the Greater Bay Area of Guangdong Province is famous as a hometown of many overseas Chinese and for its "diaolou", or defensive watchtowers. Two of our Life Members, Rocky Dang and Peter Stuckey have a project in the heart of the "diaolou" areas known as the Tangkou Community Project (www.tangkoucommunityproject.com) and are inviting us to join them there on an introductory weekend over Easter.

The Project provides a platform for visitors to explore and discover aspects of the extraordinary regional history, the unique architecture, the vibrant community and the ways of typical rural life in southern China. It is a revitalisation project with accommodation, restaurants, a farm where rice and many kinds of vegetables and fruit are grown and visitors are encouraged to get as hands-on as they wish, an open kitchen, a cycling centre, coffee shop, a garden courtyard and seminar facilities. We also have our own private access to an old mansion which still has many features just as when the owners left it many years ago.

We will be catching a coach from Central leaving at 9:40 am on the Friday morning. The coach takes around 4 hours all the way, via the Shenzhen Bay Immigration Check point. Upon arrival we will have a full program of activities, including visits to local mansions and diaolous (fortress towers funded by Overseas Chinese) built around a century ago. We will explore areas of interest including typical Lingnan diaolou villages. Explanation will be given of the importance of the overseas Chinese experience in this area and of the Tangkou Community Project. During the weekend we will include visits to the Li Gardens and the Zili UNESCO World heritage site. Some activities will involve cycling but alternative activities will be provided in case some participants do not wish to cycle. We will walk around the farm to learn more about rice growing and local produce and can have the opportunity to pick our own vegetables to share and take home. During the trip we will also enjoy some local gourmet meals and delicacies, especially with locally grown, fresh green ingredients. We will return by coach to Hong Kong on the Monday afternoon, arriving in the early evening.

Po Leung Kuk 145th Anniversary: Building Charity with Benevolence Heritage Walk

Saturday • 27 April 2024



Details

Po Leung Kuk is one of the largest charitable organizations in Hong Kong. In 2023, the Kuk celebrated its 145th anniversary and hosted various special exhibitions and events. Its history has always been inextricably intertwined with that of Hong Kong with twists and turns.

The Main Building of Po Leung Kuk was completed in 1932 and has been the home for countless of children admitted to the charity due to inadequate parental care. Upgraded as a Grade I historic building by the Hong Kong SAR Government in Dec 2023, the Main Building is a witness to the Kuk's charitable works in Causeway Bay since the late 20th century, and is one of the few historical buildings that retain their original purposes in Hong Kong.

Mr. Jayson Leung, Assistant Curator of Po Leung Kuk Museum, will give us the exclusive guided tour about the Main Building's architectural features, and at the same time to explore its interesting behind-the-scenes stories. Archival materials would also be shown for an exclusive view.

LOCAL VISIT

The Hong Kong Biodiversity Museum, HKU

Dr Benoit Guénard

Thursday • 11 January 2024









Our visit was generously hosted by Professor Benoit Guenard, the instigator of this relatively recent addition to the Museum community of Hong Kong. The museum is dedicated to biodiversity, serving as a natural history museum promoting and acting as a flagship for local environmental education and appreciation of our local biodiversity. Hong Kong in fact presents an astonishing diversity of plants, fungi and animals, with an estimate of more than 30,000 species. With nearly 50,000 specimens, the HKBM hosts the largest and most comprehensive biodiversity collection within Hong Kong. Some of these species, evident in local collections dating from the 20's- 70's, are now under threat in the wild. HKBM is housed in a relatively small space situated in HKU's Biological Sciences Building, but easily accessible from HKU's MTR station. On entering this space, one is immediately impressed by the glass fronted floor to ceiling cabinets housing an extensive and diverse range of animal, bird, fish, insect and plant specimens, exquisitely displayed. It is clear that in future, more space will be needed to support the museum's development and expanding species collections.

Professor Guénard introduced us to the history and objectives of the museum, answered all our members' questions about some of the chosen display specimens with great aplomb and shared his vision of what the museum represented, as a treasure trove for knowledge and understanding of our local fauna and flora. As

an expert on insects, particularly ants, towards the end of our visit, he used an I-pad linked to a microscope to give us close up views of the detailed and wonderful anatomy of some of the insects on display.

If any member is aware of a privately held species collection looking for a future home, HKBD is an obvious contact point. RASHK itself has a proud tradition of members' documentation of the flora and fauna of Hong Kong, evidenced from published seminars dating back to 1960's and 70's. As a token of appreciation, we presented our host with 2 copies of these RASHK publications.

One indirect outcome of this visit is a planned visit later this year to Hong Kong's official Herbarium, with details to be announced once available.

The Tai Hang Fire Dragon Heritage Centre

The Centre is housed in a Tai Hang designated heritage building, and recently restored. Although the Tai Hang Fire Dragon 3- day September Festival, which brings good fortune to the local residents, with its history and magnificent display is well known to Hong Kongers, the Centre was opened only in 2022 to make its history and cultural heritage status accessible to visitors throughout the year. A visit for RASHK members and their guests seemed



a highly appropriate way to welcome in the start of the Lunar New Year of the Dragon and we had a capacity group attending.



We were warmly welcomed and beautifully briefed by our knowledgeable volunteer docent host. Details of the organization and physical effort required to showcase the dragon dance around Tai Hang over 3 successive nights were also shared. Some of the background and history of the festival was evident in the exhibits of donor tablets on display as well as short video-clips
